Why I Fly RES

Those of you who have been around the NWSS for a while may notice that I fly only RES airplanes these days. There is a reason that starts with my beginnings in modeling back in the 60's.

I flew my first successful RC model in 1967 when I was living in Portland. Being in junior high with a paper route as my only source of income, I had to keep it simple and cheap. I built a Controilaire single channel transmitter and receiver from kits and added a pulse module. With this I could use an Adams magnetic actuator. The plane was cobbled together using the leftovers of two precious attempts at RC and powered by a Cox .049. It flew, and it flew very well and often. As a kid, I was ecstatic and still fondly remember those flights on that airplane.

In 1968 the family moved back to Minnesota and I put airplanes on hold until 1975 after I had finished college. I had a "real" job and began to think about RC again. There was an active local club in Duluth so I joined and jumped right back in. I purchased a five channel Kraft radio and flew trainers and full-house .40 size planes. There was no winter flying in Duluth because the field was buried under five feet of snow. However, one club member stumbled on to the concept of slope soaring. Duluth is like San Francisco -- built on a steep slope. Along the top of the slope was a scenic road with numerous turnouts and no trees. I built a Graupner Dandy and did a lot of winter slope flying with it (its still in my shop today). That was my introduction to gliders.

In 1976 I moved back to Portland. I was checking out the local hobby shop when I saw a contest announcement for a PASS thermal contest. I had no idea what thermal flying was so went to the contest. I was hooked. I built several RES ships that were popular at the time including a SD 100 and an Aquila. I hit all the contests I could. I soon realized that the RES ships were not going to be competitive with the Dodson planes of that era so I built a Maestro Megan which used flaperons. I flew it for four years and never mastered it. I then built a 100" plane modeled after the Dodson Camano. I didn't master it until I disconnected the flaps and went to top and bottom spoilers. In 1989 I built a ship that I designed myself. It had flaps. I flew it for several years and never mastered it.

By now I was beginning to realize that my brain was not wired to deal with flaps. My most successful personal design was a two-meter that used ailerons, but top and bottom spoilers instead of flaps. I flew it for over 20 years. By the late 90's I was convinced that I just didn't like flaps. Furthermore, I didn't like dealing with the added complications of all those extra servos and linkages needed for flaps and ailerons. Many of you also know that I don't like dealing with computer radios.

I guess my desire to fly simple airplanes dates back to my first rudder-only flights years ago. A RES ship is simple to set up, requires little programming, is easy to fly and gives me the same satisfaction I felt 40-some years ago. It also costs a lot less money. Fortunately, over the past 10-plus years RES has come into its own as a competition class. As a result I can fly against other RES pilots and we can challenge each other with our simplified airplanes.

Well, what can you say about this summer? So far, the 'hot' contests have only been representative of the flying, not the weather. I know a lot of flyers probably passed on this year's contest because of marginal weather predicted for the weekend, but you have to remember that 'marginal' in the Tri Cities is sometimes 'glorious' in other parts of the NWSS.

As it was, the warm temperatures hit on Friday for the practice. Saturday showed signs of rain early, but nothing really happened, though it remained on the cool side most of the day. The winds shifted around a bit throughout the day, but running with spot landings instead of the Hunski or landing lines made it easy to adjust. Given the conditions, I thought the tasks might be stretching a bit, with flights of 3P, 5-7-10-15 ID required for the first 4 rounds (in any order, declare after flight). Some people laughed at the 15 minute task, thinking it was just a joke. But...about 70% of the pilots were able to get their 15 minute flight recorded. The remaining 2 rounds were pilot's choice of any of the tasks, but you had to declare before you launched. Most people chose to fly 5's, with some venturing out for a 7, but by the end of the day everyone was feeling fairly conservative.

Sunday had slightly stronger winds, and again started with cool temperatures. However, it warmed up as the sky cleared and lift, if you could guess right, was very abundant. Same tasks as the previous day, and same results with about 60% able to reach the 15 minute task. The last two rounds were left as a choice from 3-P, 7-10-15 ID but the pilot could declare after the flight. This enabled people to feel more comfortable trying to stretch out their flight times a bit.

All in all, 18 pilots, 25 planes completed the two days. There were no injuries ('cept to some ego's of pilots needing to walk out deep into the Timothy to retrieve their planes), and I believe only 1 damaged plane. The conditions were right, the site was beautiful, but the cold drinks were still waiting to be taken by the end of the contest. A very easy, relaxed but competitive venture.

In the end, the typical favorites stole the show, but there were some promising newcomers to the 'top dog' category. Instead of giving trophies, the top finishers received coveted tins of WSU Cougar Gold Cheese!

RES and 2-M were combined as a class was for the event, with Amy Pool sweeping away the top position, followed by Doug Coleman then Jim Pugh. The top 2 places were 2-M ships; the 3rd place ship was a RES.

Competitor class only had 4 entrants, and was swept away by Don Stewart, followed by Rex Grace then Joe Campbell.

Expert class was hotly contended, with Jim Frahm taking the honors by about 200 points, then Amy Pool sneaking ahead of Curtis Hedrick by about 50 pts.

And of course, the Thermal Wiz trophy was present. It was nip and tuck, with only about 1 minute separation between each of the 2-5 places, but stepping out on top by about 5 minutes over the rest of the field was Curtis Hedrick with 97:13 minutes of flight time, and his name on the trophy for the first time this year. The trophy is quickly gathering names as each week a different pilot seems to come into grace with the thermals of Mother Nature.

Same time next year folks ... Hope to see you there!

Soldering Help

As you all know, soldering always seems to require three, if not four hands, to get the job done. There are some nifty devices available to provide assistance but I don't own one. One day I got frustrated trying to solder servo wires and decided I needed to assemble a helper. I started with a small block of oak (but any kind of wood will do). I stripped a section of three conductor house wires and removed a single strand of solid copper wire about five inches long. I drilled a hole in the wood block and press fit the wire into the hole. I then attached an inexpensive alligator clamp to the other end of the wire. The wire can be bent to any angle you want. A second wire and clamp can be installed to provide even more versatility. My well-used version is shown below.

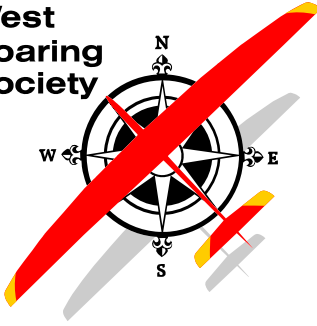
